Dear Friends:

Thank you for your interest in our Vietnamese and anti-war films. Most of the information the American public receives on the Vietnam war is from pro-war or "pro-U. S." and government sources.

Meanwhile, the majority of the people directly involved in this war, the 26 million National Liberation Front and Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Vietnam and the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, seldom catch our eye or ear—except as casualties or in brief, distorted quotes filtered through the western press.

The Vietnamese films (NLF and DRVN) described in the enclosed catalog are definitely not Hollywood productions. Their film laboratories are often crude and sometimes literally "underground!"

There are many reasons why these films have had successful showings in over 400 cities in the U.S. Shown to peace groups, community groups, on TV, etc., they have helped Americans see the problem from the Vietnamese point of view, helped make the Vietnamese understandable as real people and generally helped to counter the "Anti-Vietnamese" propaganda. Many groups have found the film showings very useful in sparking interest and controversy and in raising funds.

RENTAL TERMS are designed to make enough copies available for showings and to pay for obtaining newer and better Vietnamese films.

ALL FILMS are 16mm, black and white, with sound, unless otherwise indicated. English transcripts and/or tapes supplied where needed.

DEPOSITS can be waived if an organization will guarantee to replace the films if they are unreturnable for any reason. Otherwise we ask for a deposit equal to the sale price of the film(s). Upon safe return of the film(s), this amount, minus the rental fee, postage and insurance, will be returned. Money-order or certified check should be made payable to W. Teague. Special arrangements may be made in special circumstances—so don't hesitate to give us a call.

TO RENT: Send us (1) your deposit or guarantee; (2) your preferred screening date and one alternative date-allowing at least 10 days from the time we will receive your deposit; (3) exact name, address, and telephone number of: (a) Exhibitor, (b) Responsible person and (c) Receiver for the shipment; and (4) fill out and sign the contract sheet. Should we have any difficulty in meeting your preferred date, we will notify you immediately.

3. NGUYEN VAN TROI WILL LIVE FOREVER! Purchase \$75.

Nguyen Van Troi, a young South Vietnamese electrician, is a national hero of Vietnam. He was executed in 1964 for his complicity in an unsuccessful attempt to mine a bridge over which Defense Secretary McNamara had planned to travel. During the months of imprisonment preceding his execution Van Troi became a symbol of national resistance throughout the Third World. In Venezuela, National Liberation Forces captured a U.S. Air Force attache-whom they released after securing American assurances that Van Troi's life would be spared. The film juxtaposes Nguyen Van Troi's work, his imprisonment, and death against the efforts of the Vietnamese people to develop a peaceful technology, to organize resistance to American intervention and to destroy those whom they regard as murderers of their wives and children. 10. THE NORTH WEST FIGHTING AGAINST THE U. S. AGGRESSORS Purchase \$90. Rental \$20.

The Montagnards (minority peoples of the mountains) of "North" Viet Nam are shown in this film, to have been successfully integrated into the socialist society of the DRVN. In the DRVN's North West, the minority people have adopted modern methods of farming and fighting, but still retain their customs and identity. There is much beauty in this film.

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11. U. S. WAR CRIMES IN VIETNAM, No. 1

Produced by the Democratic Republic of Vietnam Commission for Investigation of U.S. War Crimes in Vietnam, all of the various horrible techniques of modern warfare are recorded in this film. This is not entertainment. Here are the scenes of electric torture, bombing of schools, hospitals and churches and most horrible of all, the devastation of people by napalm and anti-personnel bombs.

14. VICTORY WILL BE OURS (DRVN)

15. QUYNH LAP or THE LEPER'S ACCUSATION

DRVN-1966

Quynh Lap Leper Hospital, housing over 2,000 lepers, was bombed by U. S. aircraft from June 13 to 16, 1965. In 15 separate attacks the hospital was totally destroyed. Build in 1957 by the DRVN, this leprosarium was able in its last four years to send home to useful lives over 1,700 lepers. Easily spotted from the air as a hospital, the U. S. bombing was intended to compel the Vietnamese to "bend their knees and surrender," "but never will the Vietnamese bow down!"

16. NOW!

Made by the Japanese Commission for Investigation of War Crimes in Vietnam, this film was a gift to the American Peace Movement from the Alice Hertz Memorial Fund Foundation in Japan. Very well done, this film is good for more moderate rallies and graphically describes the anti-personnel weapons being used by the U. S. in Vietnam.

18. THE CU CHI GUERILLAS

Cu Chi, a small district adjoining Saigon, has been subjected to frequent shellings and raids by the U.S., razing to the ground hamlets and villages. The people of Cu Chi have clung to their native land and won many victories. This film gives vivid scenes of people's war, the labyrinths of underground homes and fortifications, attacks against the enemy, distruction of U.S. tanks and armoured cars by means of mines produced from captured U.S. shells, traps etc. This film also shows other aspects of life such as well cared for rice fields, children studying underground....

19. TAY NINH BEGINS ITS WINTER-SPRING FIGHT

G 7 Point Peace Proposal

The PRG 7 point peace proposal was first presented in Paris on July 1, 1971. The two basic points of this proposal, which are fundamental to any genuine settlement of the war, are:

- Regarding the military situation: The U.S. must set a date for the total withdrawal of all U.S. troops, military personnel, weapons and war materials and those of its allies.
- Regarding the political situation in South Vietnam: The U.S. must end its intervention in the internal affairs of South Vietnam and stop backing the regime of Nguyen Van Thieu.

Responding to the Vietnamese people's aspirations for peace and national independence, considering the American and the world peoples' desire for peace, showing its goodwill to make the Paris Conference on Viet Nam progress, basing itself on the 10-point over-all solution, and following up the September 17, 1970 eight-point and the December 10, 1970 three-point statements, the Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Viet Nam declares the following:

1 - REGARDING THE TERMINAL DATE FOR THE TOTAL WITHDRAWAL OF U.S. FORCES.

The U.S. Government must end its war of aggression in Viet Mam, stop the policy of . Vietnamization . of the war, withdraw from South Viet Nam all troops, military personnel, weapons, and war materials of the United States and of the foreign countries in the U.S. camp, and dis-mantle all U.S. bases in South Viet Nam, without peaing any conditions whatsoever.

The U.S. Government must set a terminal date for the withdrawal from South Viet Nam of the totality of U.S. forces and those of the other

foreign countries in the U.S. camp.

If the U.S. Government sets a terminal date for the withdrawal from South Viet Nam in 1971 of the totality of U.S. forces and these of the other foreign countries in the U.S. camp, the parties will a the same time agree on the modalities of

a) the withdrawal in safety from South Viet Nam of the totality of U.S. forces and those of the other foreign countries in the U.S. camp;

b) the release of the totality of militarymen of all parties and of the civilians captured during the war (including American pilots captured in North Viet Nam), so that they may all rapidly return to their homes.

These two operations will begin on the same date and will end on the

A cease-fire will be observed between the South Viet Nan People's Liberation Armed Forces and the armed forces of the United States and of the other foreign countries in the U.S. camp as soon as the parties reach agreement on the withdrawal from South Viet Nam of the totality of U.S. forces and those of the other foreign countries in the U.S. camp.

2 - REGARDING THE QUESTION OF POWER IN SOUTH VIET NAM.

The U.S. Government must really respect the South Viet Nam people's right to self-determination, put an end to its interference in the internal affairs of South Viet Nam, cease to support the bellicose group headed by Nguyen Van Thieu now in office in Saigon, and stop all manoguvres, including tricks on elections, aimed at maintaining the puppet Nguyen Van Thieu.

By various means, the political, social, and religious forces in South Viet Nam aspiring to peace and national concord will form in Saigon a new administration favoring peace, independance, neutrality and democracy. The Provisional Revolutionary Government of the Republic of South Viet Nam will immediately enter into talks with that administration in order to settle the following questions:

a) to form a broad three segment government of national concord that will assume its functions during the period between the restoration of peace and the holding of general elections and that will organize general election

in South Viet Nam.

A cease-fire will be observed between the South Viet Nam People's Liberation Armed Forces and the armed forces of the Saigon administration

as soon as a government of national concord is formed.

b) to take concrete measures with the necessary guarantees to prohibit all acts of terror, reprisal and discrimination against persons having collaborated with one or the other party; to ensure every democratic liberty to the South Viet Nam people; to release all persons jailed for political reasons; to dissolve all concentration camps and to liquidate all forms of constraint and coercion so as to permit the people to return to their native places in complete freedom and to freely engage in their occupations.

c) To see that the people's conditions of living are stabilized and gradually improved, to create conditions allowing everyone to contribute his talents and efforts to heal the war wounds and rebuild the country.

d) to agree on measures to be taken to ensure the holding of genuinely free, democratic, and fair general elections in South Viet Nam.

3 - REGARDING THE QUESTION OF VIETNAMESE ARMED FORCES IN SOUTH VIET NAM.

The Vietnamese parties will together settle the quextion of Vietnamese armed forces in South Viet Nam in a spirit of national concord, equality, and mutual respect, without foreign interference, in accordance with the post-war situation and with a view to lightening the people's contributions.

4 - REGARDING THE PEACEFUL RE-UNIFICATION OF VIET NAM AND THE RELATIONS BETWEEN THE NORTH AND THE SOUTH ZONES.

a) The re-unification of Viet Nam will be achieved step by step, by peaceful means, on the basis of discussions and agreements between the two zones, without constraint and annexation from either party, and without foreign interference.

Pending the re-unification of the country, the North and the South zones will re-establish normal relations, guarantee free movement, free correspondence, free choice of residence, and establish economic and cultural relations on the principle of mutual interests and mutual assistance.

All questions concerning the two zones will be settled by qualified representatives of the Vietnamese people in the two zones on the basis of

negotiations, without foreign interference.

b) In keeping with the provisions of the 1954 Geneva Agreements on Viet Nam, during the present temporary partition of the country into two zones the North and the South zones of Viet Nam will refrain from joining any military alliance with any foreign countries, from allowing any foreign country to maintain military bases, troops, and military personnel on their soil, and from recognizing the protection of any country or of any military alliance or bloc.

5 — REGARDING THE FOREIGN POLICY OF PEACE AND NEUTRALITY OF SOUTH VIET NAM.

South Vict Nam will pursue a foreign policy of peace and neutrality, establish relations with all countries regardless of their political and social system, in accordance with the five principles of peaceful coexistence, maincain economic and cultural relations with all countries, accept the cooperation of foreign countries in the development of the resources of South Vict Nam, accept the economic and technical aid of any country without any political conditions attached, and participate in regional plans for economic coope-

On the basis of these principles, after the end of the war South Viet Nam and the United States will establish relations in the political, economic, and cultural fields.

6 - REGARDING THE DAMAGES CAUSED BY THE UNITED STATES TO THE VIETNAMESE PEOPLE IN THE TWO ZONES.

The U.S. Government must bear full responsibility for the losses and the destruction it has caused to the Vietnamese people in the two zones.

7 — REGARDING THE RESPECT AND THE INTERNA-TIONAL GUARANTEE OF THE ACCORDS TO BE CONCLUDED.

The parties will reach agreement on the forms of respect and international guarantee of the accords that will be concluded.

- 11. Exhibitor agrees to send us a report on the showing indicating the attendance, response, comments, etc., and any breaks in the film.

DEPOSIT

A deposit equal to the sale price of the film(s) will be required unless we reach agreement on another method of insuring that in the event of non-return for any reason, you will immediately remit the full cost of the film(s). A written guarantee by an organization may suffice to pay any additional fees for late return.

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
